### **Creating a Plan with Flexibility**

Mentoring agreements are like roadmaps that come with expected timelines. They can be quick one-off encounters, or stretch over multiple years with outreach when needed.

## The Twist in the Plot

Sure, you've got these timelines penciled in, but sometimes life does its thing and they need a rewrite. Things can shift mid-journey due to various reasons - maybe someone's schedule goes haywire, interests evolve, or the mentorship feels complete. Changing the pace, concluding, or taking a new direction is totally part of the ride.

#### **Common Changes in Direction:**

- Changing lanes from overall evaluation insights to quick-fire specific evaluation queries.
- Swapping a meticulously planned skill-building route for more casual check-ins.
- Going from super techy to diving into reflective practices.
- Shaking up meeting schedules, from regular hangouts to sporadic catch-ups.

#### Reasons for Wrapping It Up:

- When the mentee's journey reaches a pre-set milestone.
- When the mentor has poured out all their wisdom on the chosen topics.
- When both agree a new mentor could provide a better match.
- If the mentee's journey veers from the evaluation track.

#### Reasons to Hit the End Button:

- If expectations of one party aren't clicking anymore.
- When commitments start to fade from either side.
- If disagreements on approach, values, or beliefs pop up.
- If someone vanishes into thin air (ghosting's a no-no!).

## Your Call to Action: Speak Up!

It's on you – both mentors and mentees – to voice your thoughts on where this journey should head or whether it should conclude.



#### A Win-Win Change:

Ideally, you should agree on changes or conclusions together. Have a friendly chat about whether you hit those objectives and goals. If the path shifts, mentees, your needs are in the driver's seat. Mentors, you're the co-pilot, responding with guidance and a supportive nudge. Remember, both mentors and mentees can give the thumbs up for a shift, conclusion, or grand exit anytime.
